Proceedings of 5th International Symposium on Typhoid Fever

I just received a complementary copy of the Pakistan Journal of Medical Science. It contained detailed proceedings of the symposium on typhoid fever held in February 2002 in Pakistan. The report is very useful and helps us to recall the key issues raised. It is very comprehensive and good indeed.

However, I would like to point out one serious error in reporting the speaker from Malaysia. I thought you would have the programme book of the list of speakers. On page 167, second paragraph, the researcher and speaker of the work quoted on molecular typing of MDR is Dr Thong Kwai Lin and not Dr. Shamala Devi. She is not even listed as a co-author of this particular paper (though she presented her work in another paper). As a pioneer in this area of molecular epidemiology of S. typhi, I think that this is quite an insult.

There is not enough support from the Pharma industry to meet the ever-increasing publication costs. This issue has been discussed in the Editorial Board meeting many times but for the time being there appears to be no alternative. Besides the print-edition, we also maintain an on-line edition which is very expensive since it involves payment in foreign exchange to maintain the Website. However, we do waive off the publication charges in deserving cases if a request is made by the authors.

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
